

"I Will Find a Way or Make One" Cover Art for the 2023 Southern Sociological Society Annual Meeting Earl Wright II, President

The cover art for the 2023 annual meeting of the Southern Sociological Society pays homage to Black Southern-based scholars who made seminal, yet largely overlooked, contributions to the discipline. The left side park area represents segregation and the challenges Black and White scholars had when attempting to work collaboratively. The park's right side area represents the progress we've made and how we are now able to work and live as one. The sign reads "I Will Find a Way or Make One" and was the motto for Atlanta University; now called Clark Atlanta University. It was the spirit of this motto that guided W. E. B. Du Bois, pictured in the middle of the road, as he overcame segregation and other challenges to make significant contributions to the social sciences as leader of the first American school of sociology - the Atlanta Sociological Laboratory. Standing behind Du Bois is Lucy Craft Laney, a member of Du Bois' school. To the right of Du Bois and Laney is Augustus Granville Dill, also a member of the Atlanta Sociological Laboratory, one of the first public sociologists in the nation, and, quite likely, the first openly Queer sociologist in the nation. Last, the "Tuskegee" truck driving toward the group represents a "movable school" established by Booker T. Washington that travelled across the country to show farmers and Black businesspersons what was accomplished by the nation's first applied rural sociology program and how it could be used to improve their professions. Summarily, this cover art provides an opportunity for viewers to gain a more holistic understanding of the discipline's major contributors while grounding the American South as central to sociology's origin, early development, and future configurations.

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
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Social Currents

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Southern Sociological Society Anti-Harassment Policy

SSS reminds everyone: Our Annual Meeting is convened for the purposes of professional development and scholarly educational interchange in the spirit of free inquiry and free expression. Harassment of colleagues, students, hotel staff or other conference participants undermines the principle of equity at the heart of these professional fora and is inconsistent with the principles of free inquiry and free expression. Consequently, harassment is considered by SSS to be a serious form of professional misconduct.

The following Anti-Harassment Policy outlines expectations for all those who attend or participate in SSS meetings. It reminds SSS meeting participants that all professional academic ethics and norms apply as standards of behavior and interaction at these meetings.

Purpose

SSS is committed to providing a safe and welcoming conference environment for all participants, free from harassment based on age, race, ethnicity, national origin, religion, language, sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression, disability, health conditions, socioeconomic status, marital status, domestic status, or parental status (hereafter, simply harassment).

"Participant" in this policy refers to anyone present at SSS meetings, including staff, contractors, vendors, exhibitors, venue staff, SSS members, and all other attendees.

Expected Behavior

All participants at SSS meetings are expected to abide by this Anti-Harassment Policy in all meeting venues including ancillary events as well as official and unofficial social gatherings.

- Follow the norms of professional respect that are necessary to promote the conditions for free academic interchange.
- If you witness potential harm to a conference participant, be proactive in helping to mitigate or avoid that harm
- Alert conference security personnel or law enforcement if you see a situation in which someone might be in imminent physical danger.

Unacceptable Behavior

Harassment of any participant is unethical behavior under the American Sociological Association Code of Ethics, which offer guiding principles for how sociologists should conduct themselves in all professional activities both in person and online. Harassment consists of a single intense and severe act or of multiple persistent or pervasive acts which are demeaning, abusive, offensive, or create a hostile professional or workplace environment. Harassment may include sexual solicitation, physical advance, or verbal or non-verbal conduct that is sexual in nature; it may also include threatening, intimidating, or hostile acts; circulation of written or graphic material that denigrates or shows hostility toward an individual or group; epithets, slurs, or negative stereotyping based on group identity.

Diasporic Womanisms and Indigenous Women's Movements of the Global South

Theme: Reclaiming Our Names, Our Selves, and Our Spaces: Womanist Theory, Method, Activism, and Pedagogy

This mini-conference centers on the collective ideas of Clenora Hudson-Weems's "Africana Womanism: Reclaiming Ourselves," Mary E. Modupe' Kolawole's "Womanism and African Consciousness," Gayatri Chakravorty Spivak's "Can the Subaltern Speak?" Lila Abu-Lughod's "Do Muslim Women Need Saving?" and Gloria E. Anzaldúa's "Borderlands/La Frontera: The New Mestiza" that speak to contemporary realities for our Diasporic Womanisms and Indigenous Women's Movements of the Global South Mini-Conference. In these sessions, the need for women, men, and gender expansive members of the diasporas of the Global South to carve out an emancipatory space within Sociology for articulating collaborative struggles and priorities of whole communities will be analyzed. The mini-conference papers serve to advance a womanist framework that articulates women's oppression, resistance, and survival as inextricably tied to the oppression, resistance, and survival of their families and communities. Therefore, womanists prioritize community-facing dialogue with and work against oppression alongside women, men, and gender-expansive community members as self- and community- affirming work that matters and work that counts. Womanist theorizing encompasses intersectional approaches to understanding race, class, gender, sexuality, without privileging decontextualized gender and patriarchy. Womanists insist on their autonomy to self-name. They also self-define their oppression and their agency in their struggles to preserve ancestry, land, and community in the face of colonialism, racial capitalism, coloniality, neocolonialism, military occupation, white supremacy, cultural imperialism, and epistemic violence.

Theme: Advancing the Social Science of Disasters

From Bullard's (1990) Dumping in Dixie to numerous works on Hurricane Katrina and the Deepwater Horizon oil spill, Southern sociologists have repeatedly advanced our understanding of the causes and consequences of socioecological hazards and disasters, environmental justice, and climate change. This mini-conference will include both qualitative and quantitative analyses of hazards, disasters, coastal environments, and climate change in and beyond the Southern United States. Contemporary disasters in the South such as the Jackson, Mississippi, water crisis highlight the need for ongoing research on socioecological disasters across the region as does the annual meeting's location in coastal Myrtle Beach. However, in an era characterized by a range of hazards and disasters associated with global climate change, the results of such analyses carry considerable significance beyond the region, and we encourage projects from any region globally.

About the Speakers



Elizabeth Higginbotham, PhD. Professor Emerita, University of Delaware, is a native New Yorker who grew up in diverse communities. Her education and career took her to other places including Memphis, Tennessee where she was a member of the Southern Sociological Society. However, it was her working-class parents and home city that stamped her. Elizabeth decided to become a teacher in the fourth grade. Living in a city that offered a free university system helped her achieve her plan of becoming an educator. While attending City College of New York Elizabeth met faculty who raised her goal from teaching high school to college.

They encouraged her to pursue an advanced degree in Sociology, which she did, and in 1980 she earned a doctorate at Brandeis University.

Prior to her arrival at the University of Memphis, then called Memphis State University, Bonnie Thornton Dill had started the Center for Research on Women to advance the study of women of color and Southern women. Elizabeth moved to Memphis in 1983 to help her shape it. Together they conducted research, engaged in faculty development, and trained many promising students; a good number of whom became very successful sociologists. The trio that built the center, Bonnie Thornton Dill, Lynn Weber, and Elizabeth were recipients of the American Sociological Association Jessie Bernard Award and Distinguished Contributions to Teaching Award in 1993. The impact of Elizabeth and the Center for Research on Women on the discipline is tremendous and continues to serve as a template for other social equity initiatives.

Elizabeth is an accomplished scholar and author of *Too Much to Ask: Black Women in the Era of Integration*, co-author with Margaret L. Andersen of *Race and Ethnicity in Society: The Changing Landscape*, and co-editor of *Women and Work: Exploring Race, Ethnicity, and Class* with Mary Romero. In addition, she has published many articles in peer-reviewed journals and anthologies on women and work, women in higher education, and curriculum transformation.



B. Brian Foster, PhD is a writer, storyteller, and sociologist from Mississippi. He earned his Ph.D. in sociology from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and currently works as Associate Professor of Sociology at the University of Virginia. In his awardwinning book, *I Don't Like the Blues: Race, Place, and the Backbeat of Black Life*, Professor Foster takes his research agenda to the Mississippi Delta. The book follows Black residents in the town of Clarksdale both as they navigate the on-the-ground impacts of substantial demographic restructuring in the Delta region and as they make sense of the town's attempt to use blues and heritage tourism as

a tool to revitalize the local economy.

Dr. Foster currently serves as co-editor-in-chief of *Sociology of Race and Ethnicity*, the flagship peer-review journal for sociological research on race, racism, ethnicity, and related topics. His current work includes a collaborative photo-essay collection entitled *Ghosts of Segregation* and his next major research undertaking, *Casino Town*. Dr. Foster has also directed two award-winning short films and has bylines with *Bitter Southerner*, *CNN*, *Delish.com*, *Esquire*, the Ford Foundation, *Veranda* magazine, and the *Washington Post*.



Zandria F. Robinson, PhD is a writer, ethnographer, and music scholar working at the intersections of race, gender, popular culture, and the U.S. South. She earned the Bachelor of Arts in Literature and African and African American Studies and the Master of Arts in Sociology from the University of Memphis and the PhD in Sociology from Northwestern University. Robinson's first book, *This Ain't Chicago: Race, Class, and Regional Identity in the Post-Soul South* won the Eduardo Bonilla-Silva Outstanding Book Award from the Division of Racial and Ethnic Minorities of the Society for the Study of Social Problems. Her second monograph, *Chocolate Cities: The Black Map of American Life*, co-authored with Marcus Anthony Hunter, won the Robert E. Park Book Award from the Community and Urban Sociology Section of the American Sociological Association. She is a past president and long-time executive committee member of the Association of Black Sociologists. Dr. Robinson's writing can be found in several places, including *Rolling Stone*,

Scalawag, Believer, Oxford American, The New York Times Magazine, and Glamour.



Clarence D. Armbrister, JD
President, Johnson C. Smith University

Clarence D. "Clay" Armbrister became the 14th president of Johnson C. Smith University in 2018. Armbrister, who brings over 35 years of experience in the private and public sectors, has an extensive background at all levels of education, including time in senior administrative and leadership positions at Temple University, Johns Hopkins University, the School District of Philadelphia and Girard College. In addition to his background in education, Armbrister has held executive positions in law, government and finance.

Armbrister began his professional career as a lawyer in the Public Finance Department of Saul, Ewing Remick & Saul, leaving as a partner in 1994 to serve as Philadelphia City Treasurer, where he managed the city's funds, investments and debt. In 1995, he coordinated the presentations of city officials which convinced the rating agencies to restore the City of Philadelphia's debt ratings to investment grade from "junk bond" ratings.

He went on to become the Managing Director of the Philadelphia School District, which at the time was the fourth largest school district in the country. Serving simultaneously as its chief financial officer and chief operating officer, Armbrister addressed head-on the issue of inadequate funding to urban schools compared to their suburban counterparts and significantly advanced the debate.

His return to the private sector as an investment banker at PaineWebber (subsequently UBS) saw him advance quickly, from a vice president to a director in the Municipal Securities Group, where he led nationwide efforts in underwriting transactions for issuers in the K-12 public education market.

Armbrister's strong belief in the transformative powers of education was the primary factor in his return to the field of education. Armbrister joined Temple University and for the next five years progressed from senior vice president for administration to executive vice president and COO. During his tenure, Armbrister was responsible for \$400 million in capital projects on several campuses and managed the campus through a rapid conversion from primarily a commuter school to a residential campus. He also led Temple's management, planning and coordination of student affairs, facilities management services,


campus safety services, intercollegiate athletics, computer and information services, affirmative action, enrollment management services, and management analysis.

Armbrister has also taught in higher education. He served as an adjunct faculty member at Temple, developing and teaching a municipal finance curriculum in the Beasley School of Law. Additionally, he served as chief of staff to the president and senior vice president at Johns Hopkins University and more recently, president and CEO at Girard College, a 170-year-old historically unique Philadelphia boarding school.

Armbrister has been successful at the highest levels of municipal government, working with some of the most well-known politicians in the recent history of Philadelphia and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Session Glossary

AMCR- These "Author-Meets-Curious-Reader" Sessions are an opportunity for authors and other experts in their field to discuss recent publications. Join these conversations to learn more about new sociological material and to hear from those likely to agree, or disagree, with the conclusions drawn.





Mini-Conference—A formal grouping of paper sessions around a central theme. The sessions provide an opportunity to learn from authors about the work they have been doing and the new sociological knowledge. These mini-conference sessions are built of 10-minute presentations and question-and-answer sessions where time allows.

Panel Sessions- These curated conversations focus on a topic and the scholars making waves within it. In viewing these sessions, you will both learn from those presenting and have the opportunity to ask questions to learn more about the subject.

Paper Sessions--Paper sessions are the opportunity to learn from authors about the work they have been doing and the new sociological knowledge coming out of it. These sessions are built of 10-minute presentations and question and answer sessions where time allows.

Plenary Session— An invited formal presentation to the entire society focused on a topic that highlights the theme of the conference.

Poster Sessions- Almost paper sessions but based on posters, these sessions allow scholars to share their work with an active audience. Presenters in these sessions range from undergraduates sharing their work with the community for the first time to tenured professors continuing to share their knowledge.



Presidential Address—A formal session that serves as the keynote address of the society delivered by the president.

Roundtables— Roundtables are informal presentations focused more on conversations about the researcher's topic. These do not include formal presentations opting instead for an informed conversational approach.
