


About the Art and the Artist

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Session Glossary

AMCRs: These "Author-Meets-Curious-Reader" Sessions are an opportunity for book authors and other experts in their field to discuss recent publications. Join these conversations to learn more about new sociological material and to hear from those likely to agree, or disagree, with the conclusions drawn.

Mini-Conference: A formal grouping of paper sessions around a central theme. The sessions provide an opportunity to learn from authors about the work they have been doing and the new sociological knowledge. These mini-conference sessions are built of 10-minute presentations and question-and-answer sessions where time allows.



Panel Sessions: These curated conversations focus on a topic and the scholars making waves within it. In viewing these sessions, you will learn from those presenting and have the opportunity to ask questions to learn more about the subject.

Paper Sessions: Paper sessions are the opportunity to learn from authors about the work they have been doing and the new sociological knowledge coming out of it. These sessions are built of 10-minute presentations and question and answer sessions where time allows.

Plenary Session: An invited formal presentation to the entire society focused on a topic that highlights the theme of the conference.

Poster Sessions: Almost paper sessions but based on posters, these sessions allow scholars to share their work with an active audience. Presenters in these sessions range from undergraduates sharing their work with the community for the first time to tenured professors continuing to share their knowledge.

Presidential Address: A formal session that serves as the keynote address of the society delivered by the president.

Roundtables: Roundtables are informal presentations focused more on conversations about the researcher's topic. These do not include formal presentations opting instead for an informed conversational approach.

Thematic Sessions: These paper sessions and panel sessions have been selected because of their unique connection the conference theme, "Disrupting Binaries."

Workshops: Focused on skills sociologists use such as publishing and teaching, these provide an opportunity to learn from colleagues about the inner workings of our discipline. Attend these to learn from experienced members of our network about the ways they do their work as sociologists.



Southern Sociological Society Anti-Harassment Policy

SSS is committed to providing a safe and welcoming conference environment for all participants, free from harassment based on age, race, ethnicity, national origin, religion, language, sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression, disability, health conditions, socioeconomic status, marital status, domestic status, or parental status (hereafter, simply harassment). Harassment of colleagues, students, hotel staff or other conference participants undermines the principle of equity at the heart of these professional fora and is inconsistent with the principles of free inquiry and free expression.

Harassment of any participant is unethical behavior under the American Sociological Association Code of Ethics. Harassment consists of a single intense and severe act or of multiple persistent or pervasive acts which are demeaning, abusive, offensive, or create a hostile professional or workplace environment. Harassment may include sexual solicitation, physical advance, or verbal or non-verbal conduct that is sexual in nature; threatening, intimidating, or hostile acts; circulation of written or graphic material that denigrates or shows hostility toward an individual or group; epithets, slurs, or negative stereotyping based on group identity.

All participants at SSS meetings are expected to abide by this Anti-Harassment Policy in all meeting venues including ancillary events as well as official and unofficial social gatherings. If you witness potential harm to a conference participant, be proactive in helping to mitigate or avoid that harm. Alert conference security personnel or law enforcement if you see a situation in which someone might be in imminent physical danger.
